Notarization Explained in Eight Simple Steps

In May, we started the series detailing the Eight Simple Steps to Notarize a Document. Our notaries are asking great questions on social media and through our email account, so we decided to step back and go through the Eight Simple Steps you need to complete for your notarial act. We are addressing them one at a time in each newsletter.

We have looked at Require the Personal Appearance of the Principal Signer(s) of the Document, Positively Identify the Principal Signer(s) of the Document, Verify the Signature on the Document, Take the Acknowledgement or Administer the Oath or Affirmation, Complete the Journal Entry, Complete the Notarial Certification Language, and Affix the Official Notary Seal.

This month tackles the **Eighth Step**:

Step 8: Affix the Official Notary Seal

You've completed the seven steps to notarize a document. Now it's time for the eighth and final step: to perform a proper notarial act, you must affix an impression of the official notary seal.

Make sure your notary seal is placed near your signature and on the same page as the notary certificate wording. And remember (this is important), you cannot affix your seal until **after** the notarial act has been performed. [G.S.10B-36(b)]. Do not ever place your notary seal on a document that has not been completely executed.

Fast Five Q &A

Q: How long should I keep my journal after my commission expires? NC notaries are instructed to keep their journals for 10 years past the last day of their notary commission, after which time they can destroy them. However, notaries may find they need to keep their journals longer based on the type of business practices in their specific industry.

Q. Several notaries have sent us emails this year asking how they can change their contact information.

A notary can change his or her address (residence, business or other), telephone number, email address, or employer information by sending the Department a completed Name/Address Change form found here: www.sosnc.gov/forms/by_title/ notary.

Please be sure to notify us within 45 days of your contact information change.

Q: Is a journal required for emergency video notarizations?

Yes. Since it is required, we created a template for you with the equired pieces of information. We have also created new emergency video notarial certificates with the statutory language that has to be included: https://www.sosnc.gov/divisions/notary/Emergency_Video_Notarization.

Q: Can I decide what kind of notarial act or certificate they need if the person did not provide one?

No. A notary must always ask the signer what type of notarization is needed when a document is presented to a notary for notarization without a notary certificate. Notaries are not authorized to determine which type of certificate should be used.

However, if the document does not have a pre-printed notary certificate, the notary may allow the signer to choose from all of the certificates available and select the one that he or she would like the notary to execute.

Q: This question also came to us via email. Am I allowed to notarize my own signature?

No. A notary may never notarize his or her own signature.

COVID-19 + Notaries

Sunset for Emergency Video Notarizations Has Been Extended:

The sunset date for conducting emergency video notarizations is now March 1, 2021.

Notary Oath Extensions:

Notaries still have 90 days to take their oaths at the Register of Deeds Office in their county of residence. This length of time was extended from the traditional 45 days that notaries typically have to appear before the Register of Deeds. The 90 day period starts on the issue date found at the top of the oath notification letter that you receive from our office. The 90-day extension deadline is also March 1, 2021.

Register of Deeds Offices:

Notaries must contact the Register of Deeds Office in their county of residence about their hours of operation during the coronavirus pandemic. Some of these offices are accepting walk-ins while others are requiring appointments.
